MYCF welcomes back Dr. Christopher Thurber, creator of ExpertOnlineTraining, on Tuesday, July 13 at Camp Wohelo to offer all Maine camp staff a mid-season leadership development workshop. Both workshops will combine skills training with a “Case Conference” format, based on actual leadership challenges your staff have experienced. Come with questions...**Leave with real-life solutions from a nationally recognized youth development professional!**

Chris says, “sometimes directors ask me, “Will there be any overlap between what you train our staff on in pre-season and what you do at the MYCF workshop? The answer is “No overlap at all.” The reason is that I use a case study format. (Staff bring their own tough scenarios to discuss.)... it won't be the same as anything I've done with Maine Camps pre-season.”

Both interactive workshops will give staff from different camps a chance to learn from one another, consult with Chris about real campers and scenarios, and share their experience of working with children at a Maine summer camp. 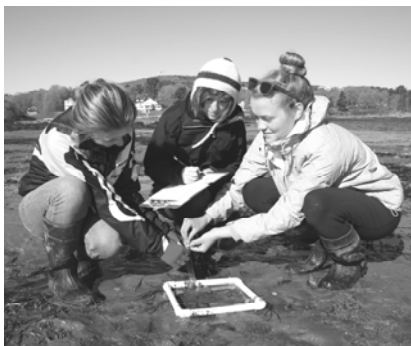

STATE LICENSE FEES TO INCREASE IN 2011

Legislation that passed this spring allows the Department of Health & Human Services to raise licensing fees for all DHHS licensed entities, including summer camps. Youth camps, restaurants, lodging places, campgrounds, electrologists and others will face higher fees. While the legislation allows the department to impose up to a maximum fee of \$300, immediate fee increases to that level are not likely. Current licenses for day camps and trip/travel camps are \$45/year and resident camp licenses are \$95/year. Fees have not been increased in at least several decades.

The department no longer receives General Fund money from the state, and must raise its revenues solely through license fees. Stakeholder groups, including camps, have been invited to work with the state to develop a new fee structure. Several meetings have been held, with several more are expected before the fee increases go to a public hearing. MYCF will notify its members of the hearing date. STATE TOURISM WEB SITE LAUNCHES YOUTH CAMP PAGE

Visitmaine.com, the state's official tourism website, now has a page specifically promoting Maine youth camps! The page is the outcome of meetings last summer and fall with Pat Eltman, the Director of the Office of Tourism, and her marketing staff. Having a camp page on the tourism site made sense, since camps have such a large economic impact on the state's economy, and bring so many visitors into Maine. DO YOU GET THE FEELING SOMETHING IS MISSING?

Well, maybe it is! Every state treasurer keeps a list of "unclaimed property", money and other personal assets that are considered lost or abandoned when an owner cannot be located after a specified period of time. It includes checking accounts, certificates of deposit, over payments, gift certificates, paid-up life insurance policies, unpaid wages, uncashed checks, death benefits, dividends, insurance payments, money orders, refunds, savings accounts, stocks and contents of safe deposit boxes. Unclaimed Property does not include real estate, animals or vehicles.

It is easy to see if you or your business has some unclaimed property in Maine and to submit an on-line claim; go to www.maine.gov/treasurer/unclaimed_property/online/. **THERE ARE CAMPS WITH UNCLAIMED PROPERTY OF OVER \$100 ON THE LIST.** You can also check in other states where you've lived or had a business. Maybe you'll get a nice surprise!

SPOTLIGHT ON: CAMP TAKAJO*Featuring MYCF camps in order of founding dates*

*The Arch Ideals

Camp Takajo was founded by Morty Goldman in 1947 as a summer camp for boys. Legend has it that he and his wife, Elise, looked at over 100 campsites, but the first one they saw was the one they ultimately chose. Walking down the main camp road, Morty and Elise were inspired by the towering Maine pines and the magnificent expanse of Long Lake. For the next forty-two years, their lives would become intertwined with the lives of thousands of campers and counselors who would be enriched by the experiences and friendships forged by the Takajo experience.

Prior to 1947, the grounds had been the site of Camp Kearsarge for girls. When Morty went on soliciting trips in 1946, he would bring the Camp Kearsarge yearbook with pictures of girls in bloomers playing field hockey and basketball. As he explained his vision, he would point to the photos and say to prospective parents, "Here's where we're going to put the baseball field and here's where the tennis courts will be." Charming and convincing, Morty enrolled 96 boys for Takajo's inaugural season.

At the very first meal in the dining hall, Morty turned to his boyhood friend, Zip Wagner, who would be at Morty's side for the next forty-two summers, and said, "Here we go. We'll see how long it lasts." Sixty-four years later, Camp Takajo continues to thrive, providing boys with stimulating and challenging experiences that

build character and promote strong moral values.

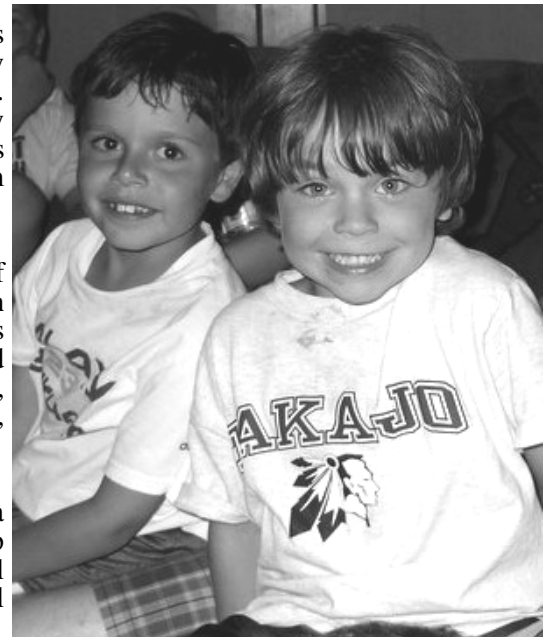
When Morty retired, he sold the camp to Jeffrey Konigsberg. Jeff's roots at Takajo literally go back to 1947 when his father, Donny, was one of the original 96 campers. Jeff started his camping career in 1970 and has been at Takajo every summer since. After nine years as a camper, he became a basketball counselor, then group leader, associate director and, in 1988, owner and director. Sharing Morty's vision, Jeff has maintained the standards of excellence and stayed true to the traditions of the camp.

Camp Takajo has been renowned through the years for its diversity, carefully designed programs, and exceptional facilities. The fundamental emphasis, brought home through all the sports and games and special events, is on instilling boys with the highest moral and ethical standards. Integrity, a sense of fair play, respect for oneself and others, appreciation of nature — these are vital qualities that are consistently reinforced in camp.

Over the years, Takajo has evolved into three distinct divisions: Warriors (ages 7-10), Juniors (11-12) and Seniors (13-15). Each camper's daily activities take place within his own group to best meet his individual needs. Each division has its own group leader who has been at Takajo for many years and its own staff. Each counselor lives and works only within his division which allows him get to know each camper personally and perform more effectively in his activity.

Participation in team sports is complemented by an extensive array of hobbies and skills. Properly structured, athletic competition provides an opportunity for each camper to challenge himself, to use the skills he is developing, to cultivate a positive attitude, and to learn good sportsmanship. A wide range of hobbies (woodworking, ceramics, art, journalism, photography, dramatics, music) and skills (sailing, water skiing, canoeing, golf, archery, in-line skating) ensure a well-rounded program.

There are many special trips at Takajo. Senior campers (age 15) spend a week in Utah and Nevada, camping and visiting national parks, ending up in Las Vegas before returning to camp for all the season ending special events. Sub-Seniors (age 14) have a choice of trips to Acadia National Park, Mount Katahdin, the Saint Croix River or golfing at Sugarloaf. They also have a five day trip to Quebec and Montreal. Intermediates (age 13) enjoy a four-day trip to Cape Cod and Martha's Vineyard.

Over sixty-four years, programs have been added, facilities expanded, and trips extended, but through it all, Camp Takajo has remained steadfast in its commitment to traditional values that help boys become young men of integrity and compassion.

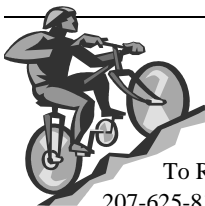
